COURSE DESCRIPTION

This semester introduces a wide array of themes in the study of Systematic Theology. It builds on the broad foundation of biblical knowledge gained in OT/NT Survey and aims to provide a core knowledge of theology for eventual use in teaching, leadership, counseling, apologetics, and evangelism.

SEMESTER OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this semester, students will be able to...

- A. Identify and defend key doctrines of the faith.
- B. Identify key ministry passages concerning each doctrine.
- C. Be familiar with the overall disciplines of Systematic Theology and each subtopic.
- E. Be able to think clearly about and answer controversial and difficult areas of theology.
- F. Better understand the use of the whole Scripture in life and ministry.
- G. Grow in the application of the whole Scripture to their personal lives.
- H. Advance in reading comprehension, analytical thinking, writing and communication, especially relating to Systematic Theology.

Weekly Quizzes

The quizzes are in Canvas and require you to log-in. Quizzes must receive a minimum of 80% to pass. Flashcards (Quizlet) may be used to prepare for the quizzes...

Systematic Theology Presentations

Students will write two papers (3 pages max), one on a topic from "List A" and one on a topic from "List B" (Lists A and B are available on Canvas). Topics not listed on either list may be considered, please contact the course Administrator. For each assignment, the student must advance an argument on the chosen topic with a strong thesis statement and a logical structure. The student will use this thesis and structure to make a 15 minute presentation on the topic in class. Students will sign-up for slots on Canvas; 2 slots will be available each week (A spreadsheet with all slots listed will be on Canvas, students may trade over the course of the semester and communicate the trade to the TA). The paper will be due the week of the presentation and will be graded. The other students in the class will provide live feedback in class on the following questions: Was the speaker engaging? Was the main point discernable? Were the subpoints clear and helpful? Was the source material relevant? The use of slides is acceptable but not required.
